



## World Youth Alliance supports the Duke of Luxembourg's Decision to Veto Euthanasia Legislation

Wednesday, December 17, 2008 (Brussels): On Tuesday, December 2, 2008, the Grand Duke Henri of Luxembourg, threatened to veto proposed legislation that would legalize euthanasia in Luxembourg. The legislation had its first reading back in February of 2008, and was set to pass this week but for the Grand Duke's veto power. In response to the Grand Duke's announcement, the Prime Minister of Luxembourg, Jean-Claude Juncker, said he would support a constitutional amendment that would remove the veto power from the Grand Duke. On December 11<sup>th</sup>, the deputies voted for this amendment which would allow the Parliament to function independently of the monarchy, with the Grand Duke exercising merely a symbolic role in the passing of laws in Luxembourg.
