


Letter from the Founder

Dear Friends,

It's a pleasure to report on the successes of 2012 and outline the tremendous growth and expansion WYA continues to experience. Our dedicated staff, volunteers, members, and alumni worked hard to meet our strategic goals for 2012:

- **build a global coalition of young people,**
- **provide education on the dignity of the person, and**
- **develop alternatives to programs that violate the dignity of the person.**

Here are a few highlights from 2012:

- Our regional offices drove up worldwide membership numbers by an additional 25,000 members in 2012.
- We opened our sixth regional office in the Middle East and began operations in Beirut.

- Each international region hosted an Emerging Leaders conference.
 - By expanding cultural programs and alumni opportunities, we more fully engaged members and alumni in the WYA mission, in particular with our newly launched International Arts Forum.
 - Thanks to ongoing relationships with diplomats and legislators, WYA proposed language that made its way into official documents of the United Nations and European Union.
 - We continued to publish new white papers as invaluable sources of information for our allies and for the training of our members.
 - We developed our fourth through sixth grade human dignity curriculum which was launched in public schools in the Caribbean in early 2013.
- I'm also very excited to report on the development and "quiet launch" of FEMM

(Fertility Education & Medical Management), a reproductive health model that provides a dignity-affirming alternative to existing, inadequate models such as those offered by Planned Parenthood. The FEMM project is currently being implemented through the health system in St. Lucia, as well as through a private clinic model for the US. Integration between FEMM and WYA's advocacy work continues closely.

Looking ahead, we're committed to making the most of the ground gained in recent years, building upon and developing our newly launched programs, and strengthening our core work to advocate for and educate on the dignity of the human person at the international level.

We know that none of this would be possible without the support of our members, friends, and donors. Thank you from the bottom of my heart for your continued investment in the World Youth Alliance!

Anna Halpine | Founder and CEO

Anna Halpine is the founder of the World Youth Alliance and was the WYA president from 1999 to the spring of 2007. She holds a master's degree in philosophy of religion from Yale University (2009) and a bachelor of music, cum laude, from Mt. Allison University in Canada (1999). She has studied piano at the Taubman Institute and voice at the Juilliard School. As founder and past president of WYA, Anna has traveled and lectured extensively.

Geographic Expansion

WYA expanded its geographic presence dramatically in 2012.

In particular, **WYA opened a new office in Beirut, Lebanon, in September.** The office hosted the first ever WYA Middle East Emerging Leaders Conference, launched its first official Track A Training Program (with over sixty participants), grew to nearly 1,000 members, and completed the first WYA Middle East Internship Program for regional staff.

WYA Middle East regional staff also met with the American University of Beirut, World Vision Lebanon, Aie Serve, and the Youth Economic Forum. They participated in both the World Youth Want Conference and the Arab Youth Coalition in Cairo. During these events, WYA staff informed youth participants of the importance of language which protects the dignity of the person, especially in international diplomacy. WYA Middle East also held workshops on the topic of sustainable development which were spotlighted with an article published in *Al Hayyat*, a

national Lebanese newspaper. Additionally, the WYA Middle East office arranged a partnership for 2013 with the Lebanese American University in order to provide WYA training for students.

REGIONS:

- **WYA Europe** saw a significant increase in the number, quality, and diversity of membership activities in its region. In March, the Europe office launched a Spanish chapter in Pamplona at the University of Navarre with more than twenty participants. WYA also started a chapter in Madrid, Spain, with over sixty new members, and the chapter secured significant coverage of the launch event in mainstream press. WYA Europe hosted a series of training seminars in conjunction with the Summer Olympics in London, educating European members about the role of human dignity in relation to advocating for persons with disabilities. A result of this project was a strengthened WYA national

chapter presence in the UK and growing alumni engagement.

- **WYA Caribbean** hosted a four-day camp at Corinth Secondary School with a total of eighteen participants, building on the curriculum used for the WYA International Summer Camp.
- **WYA Asia Pacific** hosted its 4th DigniTEA Party in November. Attendees were able to engage with members from the deaf community. The Asia Pacific Summer Camp was another success, providing in-depth training and membership growth for the region.
- **WYA North America** brought in 300 new members in November during a talk to students on person-centered international development at Arizona State University. WYA also presented to over 600 students at Highland High School in Arizona. The WYA chapter at Fordham University participated in WYA's annual Emerging Leader's Conference, with Fordham bringing in over 350 new members in 2012!



Membership

In 2012, WYA membership increased by over 25,000 members.


All WYA regional offices saw significant growth in membership in 2012, thanks in large part to rigorous campus tours, special “membership month” drives, online campaigns, and events to attract new members.

A few membership growth highlights include:

- In 2012, WYA **visited over 75 schools** and academic institutions.
- WYA held a photo contest on “**Human Creativity: Our Greatest Resource**” in which members voted on other members’ photos using social

media networks such as Facebook. The contest generated 2,500 new Facebook “likes.”

- WYA engaged alumni and enlisted their skills and expertise by hosting the **Asia-Pacific Intern-Alumni Get Together** and an **Alumni Barbecue** at headquarters in New York.



member profile:

ANDREA GUADARRAMA PRADO

I became an active member of the World Youth Alliance in 2006, when I was only sixteen years old. **I would say that signing the WYA Charter was the best decision I have ever made in my life.** It happened to be the beginning of an amazing journey throughout my youth that is still ongoing.

Through WYA, I found young people from all over the world who were passionate about the defense and promotion of human dignity. Despite my young age, WYA was committed to getting me involved in interesting academic studies in areas such as philosophy, art, history, human rights, and international law.

I cofounded a WYA chapter in my city with some friends. This experience informed me as a social leader. We orga-

nized a congress on human dignity for 5,000 youth while we were still in high school.

My experiences with WYA at the United Nations and leading the chapter in Querétaro led me to law school. During my time in law school, I was always concerned about the protection and defense of human rights in my region.

The education that WYA provided allowed me to start study groups in my university where we discussed human dignity and human rights. I got a good job in the state of Querétaro’s Human Rights Commission, where I promoted human dignity through public programs.

Today, I consider myself to be an international young woman whose foundations

could not be stronger. WYA made me a proposal on a lifestyle that I am glad I took. I have traveled, I have friends from places and cultures I never imagined I would, and I became a positive leader in my community—but its greatest impact in my life has been that WYA taught me how to dream of being better and building a better world.



FEMM: Fertility Education & Medical Management

For decades now, we have witnessed the widespread corrosion of human dignity in policy and culture, particularly in the area of human sexuality. With increased international focus and funding for birth control, population control, and sexual education, most international “health” organizations are pushing radical agendas that undermine individual worth, personal choice, and human life. Ironically, after decades of sexual education, young people—especially young women—actually know very little about how their bodies even work!

In 2012, to address this growing crisis, WYA launched **FEMM (Fertility Education & Medical Management)**, a knowledge-based reproductive health education program that enables all women to be informed partners in the choice and delivery of their medical care and services.

Currently, FEMM is being piloted within the Ministry of Health in St. Lucia, alongside a complementary **K–12 sexual education program** that affirms the dignity of the human person. The St. Lucia model provides professional, medically-advanced, and life-affirming alternatives that are otherwise unavailable.

In focusing on the provision of health education in our clinics, FEMM empowers women to better understand their health and their bodies. Through this education, women gain greater respect for themselves and their bodies, leading them to make better choices and engage in healthier relationships on their way to achieving their long-term health goals.

FEMM clinics provide preventative health and counseling information, cervical can-


cer screening, STD testing, and information on women’s health and family planning according to the FEMM method. The holistic and preventative FEMM approach challenges hormonal means of contraception and reproductive treatments that suppress hormonal functioning.

Building from the success of the pilot in St. Lucia, a FEMM clinic model is being developed for implementation in the United States in order to better serve women—with the goal of serving a sufficient number of patients in each clinic in order to be self-sustaining. The first FEMM clinic opened in early March 2013.

Advocacy

As part of its ongoing advocacy work in 2012, WYA effectively represented the voice of human dignity at the United Nations, European Union, and Organization of American States, as well as issued declarations, statements, and research on timely topics involving the centrality of the human person.

A few specific highlights from 2012 include:

- **WYA Europe** attended **Intergroup on Bioethics** in the European Parliament, providing a key presence and influential voice against coercive reproductive health programs in Europe.
- **WYA North America** participated in the **World AIDS Conference in Washington, DC**. This was both an opportunity to share WYA's work and strengthen WYA's strategic partnership with AVSI.
- **WYA Latin America** monitored "Mexican Youth Agenda" by attending the meetings organized by the United Nations Population Fund and proposing an alternative proposal and language. WYA Latin American members wrote letters to members of the parliament in Uruguay, protesting against the decriminalization of abortion in Uruguay.
- **WYA Asia Pacific** monitored the **Reproductive Health Bill in the Philippines**. WYA advocates provided information regarding WYA's alternative, the Women's Health Act, drafted by WYA's advocacy team to address the need for an alternative

bill that promotes the dignity of the person, protects freedom of conscience, and recognizes the proper role of the family.

- **WYA Headquarters** attended weekly meetings of the **Children and Youth Group**, which represents the official voice of young people in the **Post 2015 process**, and hosted the second annual Youth Voices at the United Nations, an online competition to select WYA members to attend the Commission on the Status of Women.
- WYA attended the **United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development** held in Rio, Brazil, in June. WYA held an online global conversation during the United Nations Rio+20 Conference, making use of Twitter and Facebook to answer the questions of members internationally and to provide an immediate update on the conference proceedings and WYA's work at the United Nations conference.



- Six **white papers** were released in 2012 discussing critical questions in international policy. WYA white papers are valuable tools for advocacy work and for continuing the training of members on policy positions and approaches. The topics of WYA's 2012 white papers were:

- **EU Development Aid: Coercive Abortion and Sterilization Practices**
- **Family Planning**
- **HIV/AIDS**
- **Maternal Health**
- **Reproductive Health**
- **Sustainable Development.**

Education

A central element of WYA's work is education. WYA's ongoing conferences, training programs, curricula, United Nations leadership training, and internship program focus on the centrality of the human person in achieving human development. Here is an overview of major parts of WYA's educational work in 2012.

The **International Solidarity Forum (ISF)**, a World Youth Alliance annual training event, was held at the United Nations and WYA headquarters in New York in April. The ISF brought together WYA members from each of the six regions, international advisors to WYA, and experts in the field of sustainable development, the theme of the event. Over sixty young participants from twenty countries around the world attended the ISF and worked to draft a declaration on sustain-

able development. Countries represented included Belgium, Cameroon, Canada, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, France, Ghana, Hungary, Italy, Kenya, Lebanon, Mexico, Philippines, Rwanda, St. Lucia, Spain, Taiwan, the United Kingdom, and the United States.

REGIONAL LEADERSHIP:

WYA made significant progress in establishing and executing an **Emerging Leaders Conference** for each region. These conferences train regional members in key ideas and their application in global discussions. This year, the theme of all conferences was sustainable development.

In 2012, WYA also developed a **curriculum on the dignity of the human**

person for grades four through eight as well as piloted an after school program model with high school students from the Bronx in New York. The curriculum offers an introduction to WYA, an overview of major WYA themes, and lessons on major advocacy issues.

WYA's **International Summer Camp (ISC)** offered young people between the ages of thirteen and eighteen a two-week program of training and activities. The ISC was held in July at Wagner College in Staten Island, New York, and at the WYA headquarters. The camp drew youth from Belgium, Taiwan, Mexico, Canada, St. Lucia, and the United States, in addition to three counselors from Mexico and the United States, and five interns from Canada, St. Lucia, and the United States.

Attending the World Youth Alliance annual International Solidarity Forum (ISF) was an amazing experience for me. I learnt that population growth is an advantage to the human race. With the potential for human innovation, there is a solution to each one of our problems.

Cultural Projects

WYA's cultural and arts-focused initiatives highlight the transcendent nature of the human person and the possibility of intercultural solidarity. These projects are the application of the WYA mission in the worlds of film, music, and art.

In addition to our annual Manhattan International Film Festival and orchestra concerts, WYA sponsored the following cultural projects:

- **UN Film Night:** Approximately 130 guests attended WYA's cultural event hosted at the United Nations to kick off the International Solidarity Forum. The event featured screenings of short films by the top five finalists from the



WYA Manhattan International Film Festival (held earlier in January) and a performance by the WYA Chamber Orchestra.

- **Kenya's Got Talent:** WYA's Africa Office held a successful second edition of "Kenya's Got Talent" in Nairobi, Ke-

nya, in June. The event attracted more than 300 students from Nairobi's top schools. A total of 107 students signed the charter and become members of the World Youth Alliance.

- **WYA Book and Film List:** In 2012, five book/film guides were completed with discussion questions to be used on the regional level. The guides were posted on WYA's website and provide a valuable tool for ongoing membership development and education.
- **WYAlympics:** In August, thirty members from WYA Europe participated in the WYAlympics "Dignity and the Olympics: At the Crossroads of the



World" in London. Through lectures, sports, team building, and a walk along the river to see the Paralympics rings on the tower bridge, WYA members experienced the dignity of the human person as experienced in the Paralympics games.

- **International Arts Forum:** In 2012, WYA launched the International Arts Forum. Three distinguished artists spoke at this event: Mark Anthony Signorelli, poet and essayist; Mar Morosse, contemporary art Ph.D.; and Catesby Leigh, art and architecture critic. Fifteen artists participated, representing youth from countries all over the world. The event spanned three days and included lectures, presentations by artists, social events, and a private concert by the WYA Chamber Orchestra. Artists and speakers also collaborated to draft an official World Youth Alliance statement entitled "Art and the

Human Person." (<https://www.wya.net/culture/artandthehumanperson.html>). Sylvie Barbier, one of the artists, said the experience was incredibly meaningful and that she was grateful for the environment that WYA provided to discuss important ideas.



Letter from the President

Dear Friends,

Ever since I heard the founding story of the World Youth Alliance in 2006 as a university student, its message of representing the real needs of young people has stayed with me and continues to inspire me. I grew up in Congo and saw that young people there needed peace and stability in order to pursue their dreams. In Rwanda, where I lived for eight years, most of my friends were badly affected by the genocide. If people had only respected the inherent worth of every human being, I knew that my friends would have been happier with their families. WYA provided me, along with my friends, a platform to discuss the ideas which form the basis of just and peaceful societies.

In Nairobi, where I worked for over two years and volunteered in the slums, I found that the needs of its young

people were in getting a quality education, clean water, and employment. My subsequent experiences have only reinforced my conviction that we need to educate the next generation of stewards to understand and articulate the idea that every human being has inherent worth and to equip them with the necessary tools to defend it. Even in countries where there was no war as there was in Congo, no genocide as there was in Rwanda, and no slums as there are in Nairobi, young people are searching for purpose and meaning in their lives and for ways to make a difference. I am delighted to be part of a team that made the achievements contained in this report possible.

Thank you for your continued support in our work. Your contribution—as a member, as a volunteer, or as a donor—makes

a huge difference. In 2012, more young people joined WYA as members than in the previous three years put together.

I hope you enjoyed reading this report. Do not hesitate to let us know your thoughts and suggestions—we are always excited about new ideas!
